SPD | Simplify US Equity PLUS Downside Convexity ETF

FUND OVERVIEW

The Simplify US Equity PLUS Downside Convexity ETF (SPD) seeks to provide capital appreciation by offering US Large Cap exposure while aiming to boost performance during extreme market moves down via a systematic options overlay.

The fund's core holding gives investors a low-cost, index-based exposure to US large caps. A modest option overlay budget is then deployed into a series of options positions that help create downside convexity in the fund.

PERFORMANCE REVIEW

The S&P 500 Index was up 11.68% during the fourth quarter. SPD underperformed its benchmark by 1.68%.

In terms of attribution, our core equity exposure contributed 11.42%, usual accrued management fees detracted 0.06%, and we had a -1.36% contribution from put options.

This options drag was greatly due to unrealized gains in the December 2023 put spread at the start of October, causing a negative contribution in the quarter larger than the ~0.75% quarterly option spend.

DEFINITIONS

Convexity: A measure of how the duration of a bond changes as interest rates change. The greater the convexity of a bond, the greater that change will be for a specific interest rate shift.

Expiry: The time until an option expires. In the context here expiry is used to describe the length of time from when an option position is initiated to when it will expire.

Market Price: The current price at which shares are bought and sold. Market returns are based upon the last trade price.

NAV: The dollar value of a single share, based on the value of the underlying assets of the fund minus its liabilities, divided by the number of shares outstanding. Calculated at the end of each business day.

Option: An option is a contract that gives the buyer the right to either buy (in the case of a call option) or sell (in the case of a put option) an underlying asset at a predetermined price ("strike") by a specific date ("expiry"). An "outright" is another name for a single option leg. A "spread" is when options are bought at one strike and an equal amount of options are sold at a different strike, all at the same expiry.

SEC 30-Day Yield: The yield is calculated with a standardized formula and represents net investment income earned by a fund over a 30-day period, expressed as an annual percentage rate based on the fund's share price. The yield includes the effect of any fee waivers and/or reimbursements. Without waivers, yields would be reduced. This is also referred to as the "standardized yield", "30-Day Yield" and "Current Yield". The unsubsidized SEC 30-Day Yield does not reflect the effect of any fee waivers and/or expense reimbursements.
